Keylong is the **administrative capital of the Lahaul and Spiti district** in Himachal Pradesh. Located at an altitude of approximately **3,080 meters (10,105 ft)**, it lies on the **Manali-Leh Highway (NH3)** — making it a key halt between Manali and Leh.

Despite its strategic location, Keylong retains its small-town charm, making it perfect for those looking to escape the tourist crowds.

?? Best Time to Visit Keylong

Keylong has a **short travel season**, but each month offers a different kind of magic. Here's how to plan your visit:

May to September – Peak Travel Season

- Why Go? Clear skies, blooming valleys, and motorable roads via the Atal Tunnel.
- Temperature: 10°C to 25°C

Activities: Ideal for sightseeing, monastery visits, and trekking.

October to April – Off-Season (Snowbound)

- Why Avoid? Heavy snowfall blocks roads, including the Rohtang Pass and Atal Tunnel approaches.
- Exception: Winter expeditions or snow photography with proper guidance.

Pro Tip: Visit in June or early July to experience greenery and pleasant weather, before the heavy monsoon or post-snowmelt crowd.

? How to Reach Keylong

?? By Road

From Manali (via Atal Tunnel):

Distance: ~70 km
Travel Time: 2 to 3 hours
The Atal Tunnel makes this route accessible year-round (subject to weather). defaul

From Leh:

Distance: ~360 km

Travel Time: 10–12 hours

Route: Leh ? Sarchu ? Jispa ? Keylong

Best between June and September only.

From Shimla / Kaza (Spiti Route):

Travel time: Long and unpredictable; not recommended unless doing a full Himachal circuit.

Tip: The HRTC (Himachal Road Transport Corporation) runs semi-deluxe and deluxe buses to Keylong from Manali and Delhi during summer months.

?? By Air

- Nearest Airport: Bhuntar Airport (Kullu) 125 km from Keylong
- Connectivity: Limited flights from Delhi; taxis or buses from Bhuntar to Keylong.

? By Train

Nearest Station: Joginder Nagar (~250 km away)

This option is not very practical due to the long road travel afterwards.

?? Top Attractions in and Around Keylong

1. ? Shashur Monastery

Located 3 km uphill from Keylong, this 17th-century **Drukpa sect monastery** is known for its **Thangka** paintings, festival dances (in July), and panoramic views of the Bhaga Valley.

Don't miss the annual Chham (masked dance) festival — a cultural spectacle.

2. ? Gandhola Monastery

One of the **oldest monasteries in Lahaul**, Gandhola, is about 18 km from Keylong. It's less touristy, offering serene vibes and ancient wooden architecture, rare for Himalayan gompas.

3. ? Suraj Tal & Baralacha La

watermar Perfect for day trips towards Leh, these high-altitude landmarks are surreal.

- Suraj Tal (Sun Lake): The third-highest lake in India, surrounded by glaciers.
- Baralacha La: A scenic pass connecting Lahaul to Zanskar.

Altitude alert: These are above 4,800m. Acclimatization is crucial!

4. ?? Atal Tunnel Excursion

This engineering marvel connects Solang Valley (Manali) to Sissu and Keylong, cutting travel time dramatically.

• Enjoy a stopover at Sissu Lake or Chandra River viewpoint en route.

5. ?? Jispa & Darcha Villages

Just south of Keylong:

- **Jispa** (20 km): Riverside village ideal for camping and star-gazing.
- Darcha (30 km): Starting point for the famous Darcha–Padum Trek.

6. ? Gemur & Tandi Villages

- Gemur Monastery: Lesser-known but historically rich.
- Tandi: Scenic confluence of Chandra and Bhaga rivers, perfect for photos.

Local legends say that when Chandra (moon) met Bhaga (sun), they united at Tandi — hence its spiritual value.

?? Where to Stay in Keylong

Keylong offers limited but cosy accommodation options, including:

- Hotel Dekyid Best views and central location.
- The Chandrabhaga by HPTDC Government-run with decent amenities.
- Zostel Keylong (Gemur) Ideal for backpackers and solo travellers.
- Homestays Try family-run homestays in Jispa, Sissu, or Tandi for local food and warmth.

Budget Tip: Book in advance during summer. Facilities are basic but clean.

? What to Eat in Keylong

Food options are simple but hearty. Don't expect fancy restaurants, but you'll find plenty of charm:

- Thukpa & Momos: Tibetan noodle soup is a must-try.
- Siddu: Steamed Himachali bread with ghee.
- Chha Gosht: Mutton curry with yogurt gravy (for non-vegetarians).
- **Seabuckthorn Juice**: A Lahauli specialty rich in vitamin C.

Pro Tip: Ask for **local barley beer** or butter tea if you're feeling adventurous!

? Trekking & Adventure Around Keylong

- Medical Facility: A government hospital is present but limited.
- Petrol Pumps: The only fuel station in Tandi (very important for bikers).

Remember: No luxury here — come for nature and simplicity.

? Packing Tips for Keylong

- Warm clothes, even in summer (nights are cold)
- Good shoes for walking and trekking
- Medicines for altitude sickness, motion sickness, and cold
 Power bank, torch, and basic toiletria. water

? Local Culture & Travel Etiquette

- Greet locals respectfully with "Julley" or "Namaste"
- Avoid plastic waste carry your trash
- Respect monastery rules (no loud talking, no photos where prohibited)
- Learn a few local words they'll love it!
